G20

❖ Context

> Recently, India officially took over G20 presidency for 2023 after Bali summit came to an end.

Key Takeaways from the G20 Summit in Bali

Condemed Russian Aggressions

 G20 leaders adopted a declaration deploring Russia's aggression in Ukraine "in the strongest terms" and demanded its unconditional withdrawal.

• USA- China Ties

- The summit was preceded by a bilateral meeting between USA and Chinese president.
- The meeting laid out major differences, especially over Taiwan, trade restrictions and technology transfers, the two agreed to keep communications open and avoid confrontation.

• Focus on Global Economy

- The G20 economies agreed in their declaration to pace interest rate rises carefully to avoid spillovers.
- They warned of "increased volatility" in currency moves, a sea change from last year's focus on mending the scars of the COVID-19 pandemic.

Food Security

 The leaders promised to take coordinated action to address food security challenges and applauded the Black Sea grains initiative

Climate Change

- G20 leaders agreed to pursue efforts to limit the global temperature increase to 1.5 degrees Celsius.
- They confirmed that they stand by the temperature goal from the 2015 Paris Agreement on climate change.

G20

About

- The G20 is a strategic multilateral platform connecting the world's major developed and emerging economies.
- It started in 1999 as a meeting for the finance minister and central bank governors.
- Together, the G20 members represent more than 80 percent of world GDP, 75 percent of international trade and 60 percent of the world population.

Meetings

- The G20 has evolved into a yearly summit involving the Head of State and Government.
- The group has no permanent staff of its own, so every year in December, a G20 country from a rotating region takes on the presidency.

Membership

 It comprises 19 countries and the European Union (EU).



Patan Patola scarf

- Gifted to the Italian PM.
- A colourful dupatta woven in Patan, Gujarat was encased in a decorative **sadeli box**, a wooden craft native to Surat.
- The double ikat scarf can be worn on both sides. The motifs weaved on the scarf were inspired from the Rani Ki Vav, a stepwell in Patan, built in the 11th century

AD.

The ancient art also dates back to the 11the century AD.

Agate Bowls



- Presented to the leaders of France, Germany and Singapore.
- The semi-precious stone is found in underground mines of Rajpipla and Ratanpur in riverbeds of Gujarat, and extracted to produce a variety of

ornamental objects.

Mata Ni Pachedi

- Gifted to the UK PM.
- It means 'behind the mother goddess'.
- Also called the Kalamkari of Gujarat.
- Kalam is made out of bamboo.
- It is a sacred handmade textile piece made by nomadic Vaghari communities Gujarat.



- Gifted to the Spanish PM.
- It is from Mandi & Kullu, HP.
- These traditional musical instruments now increasingly used as décor objects.



Carbon border tax & Carbon Border Adjustment Mechanism

Context

> A group of countries including India has opposed the carbon border taxes policy at the COP27.

Key highlights

- > The **BASIC** group, comprising India, China, Brazil and South Africa, said it could result in market distortion.
- > Countries call for a united solidarity response by developing countries to any unfair shifting of responsibilities developing from developed to countries.

Carbon leakage

- Some developed nations, in efforts to cut emissions, impose high costs on carbon-intensive businesses in their own countries.
- Businesses can potentially sidestep this simply by moving production to a country with less stringent rules, a practice called carbon leakage.

Carbon border tax

- It involves imposing an import duty on a product manufactured in a country with more lax climate rules than the one buying it.
- It is a plan from the European Union (EU), proposed for the first time in 2021, to tax carbon-intensive products, such as iron and steel, cement, fertiliser, aluminium and electricity generation, from 2026.
- It will equalise the price of carbon between domestic products and imports and prevent carbon leakage.
- Apart from the EU, California in the US applies charges to some imports of electricity. Canada and Japan are also planning similar measures.

Carbon Border Adjustment Mechanism

- EU importers will buy carbon certificates corresponding to the carbon price that would have been paid, had the goods been produced under the EU's carbon pricing rules.
- Conversely, once a non-EU producer can show that they have already paid a price for the carbon used in the production of the imported goods in a third country, the corresponding cost can be fully deducted for the EU importer.

Climate Change Performance Index (CCPI)



❖ Context

➤ India rose two spots to rank eighth out of 63 countries in the Climate Change Performance Index 2023 (CCPI).


* Key Highlights

- ➤ In **2022 and 2021**, India stood at the **10th spot** on the CCPI, while in 2020, it ranked ninth.
- ➤ In the overall standings, **no country ranked first, second or third** on the index.
- ➤ Denmark, with a score of 79.61, ranked fourth, followed by Sweden with 73.28 points. India scored 67.35 points.
- ➤ India's ranking in categories: In GHGs, it ranked 9, Renewable Energy (24), and Energy Use (9), and on Climate Policy (8).
- The worst performers in the overall ranking are Iran, Saudi Arabia and Kazakhstan.

❖ About CCPI

- ➤ It was published by three environmental non-governmental organizations viz. Germanwatch, NewClimate Institute and the Climate Action Network (CAN) International.
- The CCPI evaluates 59 countries and the European Union, which together generate over 92 per cent of global greenhouse gas emissions.
- ➤ Using standardized criteria, the CCPI looks at four categories, with 14 indicators:
 - Greenhouse Gas Emissions, Renewable Energy, Energy Use, and Climate Policy.
- ➤ It tracks the implementation of the Paris Agreement by various countries.

Uda Devi



❖ Context

➤ Recently, events to commemorate the martyrdom of Uda Devi were held at various places in Uttar Pradesh, including Sikandar Bagh in Lucknow.

❖ About Uda Devi

- > She Born in Ujirao, Lucknow.
- > She was part of the royal guard of **Begum Hazrat Mahal of Awadh.**
- ➤ Her husband, Makka Pasi, worked as a foot soldier in the army of Awadh's Nawab, Wajid Ali Shah.
- ➤ She is remembered for her stories of valour and for her skill as a leader who managed to mobilise people — specially Dalit women — to take up arms against the British.
- ➤ Amid the **revolt of 1857**, on June 10, at Chinhat near Ismailganj, a battle was fought between the army of Lucknow and the British troops led by Henry Lawrence.
- ➤ It is said that **Uda Devi killed at least three dozen British soldiers** from atop a tree before she could be spotted.

Red-Crowned Roofed Turtle (Batagur Kachuga)



❖ Context

➤ Recently, India put forward a proposal to better protect a species of freshwater reptile called the red-crowned roofed turtle (Batagur kachuga) under the Convention on International Trade in Endangered Species (CITES).

Key Highlights

- > This species is at a high risk of extinction.
- ➤ The 19th Conference of the Parties to CITES began November 14 in Panama and will go on Till November 25, 2022.

❖ Red-Crowned Roofed Turtle

> Threats

■ Harvested for meat and shells, drowned in fishing nets, water pollution, hydro-electric schemes and habitat loss.

> Distribution and Habitat

- This turtle is found in central Nepal, northeastern India, Bangladesh and probably Burma.
- This turtle is native to India and Bangladesh.
- It is a species of freshwater.

> Conservation Status

- IUCN Red List- Critically Endangered.
- CITES- Appendix II.

❖ Context

➤ Recently, Union Minister of state for Science and Technology said that Indian Space Research Organization (ISRO) will make history on Friday (November 18) when it launches its first-ever private rocket.

Key Highlights

- > Non-government entity/startup, **Skyroot Aerospace Pvt Ltd (SAPL)** has developed the **VKS rocket.**
- ➤ Skyroot was the **first startup to sign a Memorandum of Understanding** with ISRO for launching its rockets.
- ➤ It is a single stage spin stabilized solid propellant rocket with a mass of approx. 550 kilograms.
- ➤ The rocket goes to the max altitude of 101 kilometers and splashes into the sea and the overall duration of launch is 300 seconds only.
- ➤ It will also be the maiden mission of Skyroot Aerospace, named 'Prarambh'.
- ➤ It will carry a total of three payloads in space, including one from the foreign customers."

Vikram-Suborbital (VKS) Rocket



Context


India joined the fourth meeting of the 'Moscow format consultations on Afghanistan' that was held in the Russian capital.

Key highlights

- > It is one of the several dialogue platforms on issues related to Afghanistan.
- ➤ The issues include the current humanitarian situation and the ongoing efforts of various stakeholders to provide assistance, intra-Afghan talks, formation of an inclusive and representative government, efforts to counter threats of terrorism and ensuring regional security.
- ➤ It was established in 2017, before the Taliban takeover of Kabul, as an international mechanism for Afghanistan, initially formed by six parties involving Russia, Afghanistan, India, Iran, China and Pakistan.

- ➤ Currently, it consists of Russia, China, Pakistan, Iran, Kazakhstan, Tajikistan, Kyrgyzstan, Uzbekistan, Turkmenistan and India.
- > Guests from Qatar, Saudi Arabia, Turkey and the United Arab Emirates were invited to take part in the discussion.
- ➤ India, Russia and Iran are expected to form a separate group within the format to discuss specific concerns regarding the security situation in Taliban-ruled Afghanistan.

Young Professionals Exchange



❖ Context

> The UK announced a new "partnership" with India at the G20 summit.

Key highlights

- > The scheme will commence in early 2023 and be on a reciprocal basis.
- ➤ Under the U.K.-India Young Professionals Scheme, the U.K. will offer, annually, 3,000 degree-holding Indians in the 18–30-year age group places to work in the U.K. for up to two years.
- ➤ Indians comprise almost a quarter of all international students in the U.K. and Indian investment in the U.K. supports 95,000 jobs in the country.

❖ Context

Former West Bengal Finance Minister Council has said that the Good & Services Tax (GST) council has not met over the last four-and-a-half months, in violation of the Rule 6 of the Procedure & Conduct of Business Regulations.

Key highlights

- > The Procedure & Conduct of Business Regulations of the GST Council have been formulated in pursuance of Article 279A (8) of the Constitution.
- > According to the Rule 6- "The Council shall meet at least once in every quarter of the financial year."
- Article 279A deals with the constitution of GST council.
- > According to 279A(7), one-half of the total number of Members of the Goods and Services Tax Council shall constitute the quorum at its meetings.
- As per **279(9)**, every decision of the GST Council shall be taken at a meeting, by a majority of not less than three-fourths of the weighted votes of the members present and voting, in accordance with the following principles, namely:—
 - The vote of the Central Government shall have a weightage of one-third of the total votes cast in that meeting.
 - The votes of all the State Governments taken together shall have a weightage of two-thirds of the total votes cast in that meeting.
